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Light Rail Arrives at Angle Lake Station

Sound Transit's 1.6 mile extension of light rail from the Airport Station to the Angle Lake Station on South 200th Street began service in September. The four Sound Transit projects associated with the Angle Lake Station have some minor work remaining as final bugs are worked out. These include the Guideway and Station, the Parking Garage, I-5/Military Road Improvements and Area Roadway Improvements.

The Parking Garage is open and operating. This parking garage will provide over one thousand parking spaces for light rail patrons. Additionally, the 2,220 square foot commercial space is actively being marketed with hopes that tenants will soon be in place.

The I-5/Military Road Improvement project began in August with the majority of work occurring at night to minimize neighborhood and traffic impacts. This intersection project is scheduled for completion by the end of the year and should greatly improve movement through this area.

The Future Expansion of Light Rail to Kent and Beyond!

The City has begun its preliminary review of Sound Transit's plans for the Federal Way Link Extension. The project will extend light rail from the Angle Lake Station at S. 200th Street in SeaTac, to within the vicinity of Kent/Des Moines at Highline Community College, by 2023. The project also develops a shovel-ready plan for extending light rail to the Federal Way Transit Center when additional funding is secured.



An interdepartmental working group has been assembled to begin discussions regarding the initial terms of an agreement with Sound Transit for the extension. Additionally, City staff and Sound Transit staff have discussed lessons learned from the Angle Lake construction project and identify future efficiencies.

This project will provide SeaTac residents with an expanded access to light rail throughout the south corridor.

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

Effective January 1, 2017 Kent Regional Fire Authority (RFA) will change its name to Puget Sound Regional Fire Authority. The RFA Governance Board adopted the name change at their July 20, 2016 meeting.

Why did they decide to change their name?

The decision was made to change the name of the organization since the name Kent Regional Fire Authority is no longer inclusive of whom they are or of the communities that they serve. Mergers, annexations and contracts for services have expanded the Regional Fire Authority far beyond the Kent community.

Today, the Kent RFA serves a residential population of over 175,000, second only in King County to Seattle. They also cover 60-square miles with 11 fire stations and employ around 260 personnel. The 24,000+ annual calls for service are no longer limited to Kent city limits or its residential and business community.

Connecting 28th/24th Avenue S.

Construction is underway on the "Connecting 28th/24th Avenue S." project, with an anticipated completion date of August 2017.

With the North pier constructed and majority of the utilities and retaining walls installed, the contractor is currently constructing the South pier and tunnel.

When complete, the project will have constructed a new principal arterial road between S. 200th Street and S. 208th Streets and connected 28th Avenue S. to 24th Avenue S. This project completes the north-south corridor from S. 188th Street to S. 216th Street. The new road will include four general purpose lanes, turn pockets and a shared use path along both sides. A new and improved drainage system will be constructed, and street lights and landscaping will be added. The project will also have built a new bridge and tunnel structure that will

accommodate the future State Route 509 highway with minimal impact to the 28th/24th Avenue S. corridor.

The completed corridor will improve access and circulation for the new Angle Lake light rail station at S. 200th Street and 28th Avenue S. and help ease congestion along International Boulevard. The new road will also provide access to approximately 200 acres for redevelopment and potential new jobs to the area. Public Input Needed! 2017 Stormwater Regulatory Changes — Low Impact Development

Like other cities in the Puget Sound, SeaTac is subject to federal regulation under the Clean Water Act and must comply with its Western Washington Municipal Stormwater National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Phase II Permit, a permit that allows the City to discharge stormwater to waters of the State.

By January 1, 2017, all cities subject to this permit are required to modify their codes, standards, plans and programs to integrate the use of Low Impact Development (LID) techniques into their code and development standards. Specifically, this Department of Ecology rule requires that all cities amend their development regulations to make LID the preferred and commonly used approach to address stormwater issues.

So what is LID? LID is a group of stormwater best management practices (BMPs), which focus on mimicking natural processes by infiltrating stormwater into soils onsite. The overarching goals of LID are to minimize: impervious surfaces, the loss of native vegetation and stormwater runoff. Common examples of LID are rain gardens, green roofs, concrete paver walkways, and vegetation lined swales.

Since these State driven code and standard changes will impact both property owners as well as the development community, the City is meeting with these community stakeholders to gain feedback about their concerns. This information will be helpful as we work to minimize these impacts by making only those changes necessary to meet our permit requirements and continue to look for ways to create synergies with our existing code and standards. In short, the City of SeaTac is working hard to identify a solution that both fits our local community and meets our NPDES Phase II permit requirements.

The Bow Lake Transfer Station now accepts yard waste for recycling; drop-off only. Includes leaves, grass clippings, weeds, brush and branches (must be 4 inches in diameter

or less and less than 8 feet long). Yard waste must be separated from garbage. No dirt or sod. No plastic of any kind. No food scraps. No hazardous or dangerous waste. The maximum combined vehicle and trailer length limit is 40 feet.

If possible, wait for first responders to arrive.



October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month

One in every four women will experience domestic violence in their lifetime. An estimated 1.3 million women are victims of physical assault by an intimate partner each year. Most cases of domestic violence are never reported to the police. Witnessing violence between one's parents is the strongest risk factor of transmitting violent behavior from one generation to the next. Be aware. Help stop the cycle.

Holiday and Winter Safety Tips

As we continue through fall and into winter, the City of SeaTac and the Kent Regional Fire Authority ask that all residents please consider the following fire and life safety tips to help ensure they have a safe and enjoyable holiday season.

Carbon Monoxide: CO is a colorless, almost odorless and tasteless gas which is present during any type of burning. This includes wood stoves, gas furnaces, wood burning fireplaces, generators and vehicle emissions. When inhaled, it depletes the oxygen supply in the blood stream. Symptoms of CO poisoning include lightheadedness, dizziness, headaches, nausea, vomiting, seizures, decreased levels of consciousness and in extreme cases, death.

Residents can be proactive and protect themselves by following these simple steps:

1. Have all CO producing devices in the home inspected by a professional.
2. Never bring barbeques or running generators into a home.
3. Purchase and install a carbon monoxide alarm in your home.
4. If you or someone in your home begins complaining of the symptoms listed above or your CO alarm activates, leave your residence immediately and call 9-1-1.

Smoke Alarms: Have working smoke alarms and know how to escape if they activate. Change the batteries annually and replace your smoke alarms every ten years.

Electric Heaters: Ensure that all portable space heaters and baseboard heaters have at least three feet of clearance around them to prevent fires. Keep all combustibles such as curtains, bedding and clothing away. Purchase heaters that have an auto-shutoff feature when tipped over and that have an Underwriters Laboratory (UL) rating.



Cooking: Whenever you are cooking, "keep an eye on what you fry". Never leave the kitchen when cooking and always keep pan lids handy. If a pan catches on fire, simply place the matching lid on the pan while wearing an oven mitt. Once the lid is on, turn off the burner and call 9-1-1. To reduce injuries, create a "kid free" zone in front of your stove and oven.



Candles: During the holidays and power outages candles are commonly used for decoration and light. Use them wisely. Place candles in a non-tipping base and set them where they cannot be easily knocked over by children, pets, or breezes. Always keep candles away from combustibles such as drapes, bedding, clothing, holiday decorations and Christmas trees. Lastly, "when you go out – blow it out". Never leave candles burning when you leave the room.



Decoration: Keep paper or other flammable decorations away from heat sources. Ensure breakable decorations such as tree ornaments are kept out of the reach of children and pets. Make sure

all holiday lights, extension cords and other electrical devices have the UL seal of approval. Never overload extension cords or create an extension cord "octopus".

Housing Repair Assistance Program


The City of SeaTac program provides free health and safety minor home repairs to owner-occupied homes within the City limits and the household income is less than the Annual Income listed below.

Services provided include:

- **Electrical** – faulty lights, switches, plugs, circuits or exhaust fans.
- **Plumbing** – faulty toilets, clogged drains, leaking faucets, faulty water heaters.
- **Disability Aids** – installation of grab bars, hand rails, hand-held showerheads, access ramps and application of non-skid surfaces.
- **Safety** – installation of smoke alarms, carbon monoxide alarms and locksets.
- **Other** – faulty furnaces, faulty gutters and roof leaks, broken window glass panes.

How do I qualify for these free services?

1. Live within the SeaTac City limits and be an owner/occupant for at least one year with no intention to sell in the next 12 months.
2. Complete the application process.
3. Have a household income below those listed below:
